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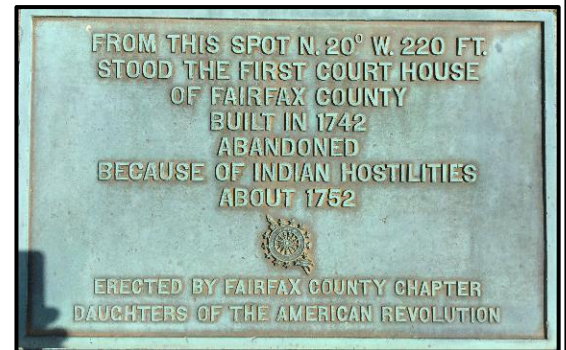
VIENNA'S CELEBRATES FAIRFAX COUNTY'S 275TH

The County of Fairfax was created by legislation introduced in May 1742, effective the following December. It was named for Thomas, sixth Lord Fairfax. The dividing line was a line up Occoquan River and Bull Run, and from the head of the main branch of Bull Run, by a straight course to Ashby's Gap in the Blue Ridge. The decision was approved by the council and governor, and it became law 19 June 1742. The original Fairfax County did not exist long. In 1757, the Virginia House of Burgesses passed an act cutting off from it the County of Loudoun. The dividing line between the two counties stood for 41 years, and then in 1798, the General Assembly of Virginia passed an act that provided a new dividing line, one which has remained to the present day as the boundary between Fairfax and Loudoun Counties.

The first Fairfax courthouse was specified in the legislation creating the county in 1742 to be located "at a place call'd Spring Fields." This location was near the intersection of Gosnell Road and Rt. 123. There is a marker by the post for the traffic lights.

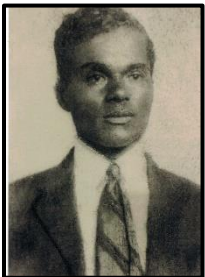

George Brown and his wife Sarah Brown.

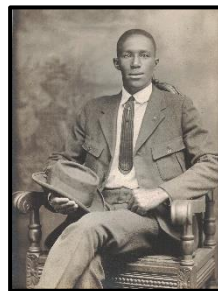
George Brown, part East Band Cherokee from Georgia and part Pamunkey/Tauxenent Nation from Fairfax County Virginia; born in Vienna in 1878. He is the son of Mack Brown who along with two other men, bought land from O. Hines in 1867 for

one dollar to build a school and church for blacks in Vienna. That church is the First Baptist Church of Vienna and a building was built on Lawyers Road to house the church and school (when the church moved to its current location, the Knights of Columbus occupied the building). The school, the Vienna colored school, shared the building and eventually became what is now Louise Archer School.

George Brown and Sarah built a house in Vienna where their descendants live today.



Sarah (Ellen Mills) Brown, a descendant of Keziah Carter, was born in Vienna on land where the Seventh Day Adventist Church stands. Keziah is said to be a descendant of Chief Powhatan of the Algonquian Indian Confederacy (Pamunkey/Tauxenent tribe).



Beverly Taylor (William Beverly Taylor) was born in Hughesville, Virginia in Loudon County in 1898. He grew up in Vienna, Virginia at 214 Nutley Street. That family home exists today and is on the register of Historic Homes in Vienna. His wife, Horine Brown Taylor, is the daughter of George and Sarah Brown, and consequently a descendant of Keziah Carter.

Little Library 120 Years Old!

Our Little Library is celebrating 120 years in The Town of Vienna. Come visit during the Viva Vienna celebration May 28 and May 29. Come look around the museum, which was our original lending library in existence from 1897.

The Little Library located on the Freeman House grounds is open the 1st Sunday of the month from 1 – 4 PM and during special community events. The library is a museum not a lending library but visitors may pass the time reading some of the old books that have been preserved.

There's More to Learn

After Seeing HVI's New Suffrage Exhibit

With the reopening of the Freeman Store in March, the Women's Suffrage exhibit has been updated to tell the story of the movement in 1917. However, we are not the only museum in the region to feature this subject. Want to learn more after seeing Historic Vienna's current suffrage exhibit?

In southern Fairfax County, the *Workhouse Arts Center* and *Occoquan Regional Park* both occupy land that was once part of the Workhouse prison where many of the suffragists were imprisoned. Although the women's portion of the workhouse no longer exists, (it was on the opposite side of Ox Road on what is now Fairfax Water Authority property), the museum at the Workhouse Arts Center has a section on the suffragists. Occoquan Regional Park currently has a small grouping of interpretive signs about the suffragists near the old brick kiln. The park is also the future site of the *Turning Point Suffragist Memorial*, which will honor the suffragists.

In Washington, DC, the *Belmont-Paul Women's Equality National Monument* on Capitol Hill tells the story of the National Woman's Party women who picketed the White House and were imprisoned at Occoquan. More recently, this group fought for the Equal Rights Amendment. Known until last year as the Sewell-Belmont House, it is the last headquarters of the National Woman's Party and today is a National Park Service site.

May 6, 2017

Weather - overcast and at times, raining. Cool in the 60s.

Quite a bit too wet to work in the garden, but time is awasting. Assessed the garden. Surprised as to the volunteer bearded wheat that was well on its way. Volunteered from last year's crop. This crop already looks better than last years'. Amusing to see the potatoes volunteering as well. Potatoes were a complete loss last year.



Young Mark and his father, Allen, arrived quite early and we jumped immediately into the work. After a general look over the garden, young Mark collected his

tobacco plants from his wagon and we planted the plants in their proper place. Mark noted that in the early days, a fish was planted with each plant. That was true of corn, but not so for tobacco. The next crop to plant was the clover. While not a food crop, we use clover to add organic matter and nitrogen to the soil for future crops. Also, our sheep find clover particularly tasty. The clover, with its small white flower, will be turned under in the fall and will create a fertile bed for next year's corn. We are grateful to neighbor Anne for the clover. I understand she is raising a number of livestock at her place - deer and chickens.
